Do you remember when the fact of suffering first hit you?

I do. It was knowing my uncle was dying at the age of 48 because no-one then knew how to replace a damaged heart valve. He sometimes said this little rhyme.

*“Here we suffer grief and pain
Over the way they suffer the same.”*

That gave him strength to endure with humour and stoicism his pain of body, mind and emotions until his death.

As I look back in history I can see acceptance was the main way of coping. Now with more cures available we search for answers. When I could not bear loud sounds in church, I had a big why to ask God. Why take from me one thing I love? Why? The only answer I received was why not.

Personal love and the suffering it brings can be very intense and I have experienced only the fringes. There are also the national and international

issues.

Why natural disasters like floods and famines?

Why didn't God stop that terrorist attack?

Why am I consumed with grief, anger and regret while the perpetrators are free?

Why does a loving God allow any suffering?

Why doesn't the church do more to help?

My uncle had a visit from a vicar as he lay dying in the mid 1950's and afterwards he told us, “He did not even say God bless you.” Perhaps suffering has led you too to drop God from your thoughts but yet you wonder if he might be the answer.

If this is something that stirs you and you can see all around you the tragedy of personal pain and the all-pervasive pain of the world I invite you to wrestle with these problems.

I believe answers can be found in the most realistic book I know – the Bible. The Bible tells it as it is and recounts many experiences of suffering. It also

offers explanations which shows that suffering is redeemable and can even be positive and life enhancing. There is more to pain than we might first think. The Bible also speaks of hope telling us we now see as through a mirror darkly but one day we will see face to face. Looking at an eternal perspective we read, "Our light momentary suffering is preparing us for the weight of glory to come."

Is this merely pie in the sky when you die or could God be more closely involved in the suffering world? The central event of our faith is an execution by the Roman state of a man whom Christians proclaim was perfect. His name is Jesus Christ. Might he be the answer to our problem of pain? Might he offer us an explanation and a way of enduring suffering with courage and even with faith and love?

If you are willing to look for answers in the Bible and Christianity you are invited to a seminar at the vicarage at 11 am on Sunday 28th July.



Super Succulents

Surprisingly, it seems that cacti and succulents are now top of the list as the most popular houseplants (according to several social media platforms); being easy to care for, they take up little space and fit in well with modern or minimalist décor. However, I have to admit that cacti don't really fill me with enthusiasm (they are not particularly child-friendly either), but succulents do present more interest, particularly now as many have been bred to appeal to new 'buyers' interested in calm, green spaces and trouble-free plants (hardly a nasty bug in sight!).



Sansevieria 'Golden Hahnii'

That old stalwart of the 1960s and '70s, the *Sansevieria* (with the awful name of *mother-in-law's tongue*), has returned but in a new guise. New, exciting varieties have arrived in garden centres: one to look out for is *S.* 'Golden Hahnii'. This compact variety (about 10 cms high) is rosette-shaped with green and bright yellow leaves (often called the 'bird's

nest' *Sansevieria*). Like most succulents, it's super-easy, tolerates neglect, likes sunlight and suits modern containers. A new shoot (rather like an asparagus tip) emerges when the plant is happy and well established, resulting in a new 'rosette'.

I also have *S.* 'Moonshine' (emerging pale green new leaves will turn a bluey/grey), and the larger *S. cylindrica* with tall shoots resembling thick fingers reaching upwards – very minimalistic! 'Twisted Sister' is on the wish list but I have yet to track her down!

Watering succulents is easy-peasy, just **don't** do it too often, in fact, water only when the soil is dry as the leaves retain moisture – worry-not when you go on holiday as they will be fine – you can even get away with only watering once a month in winter-time. Being adapted to arid conditions and deserts maximum light is important but central heating presents no problems. What's easier than that?

Give a little thought to suitable containers as most succulents are shallow rooted – I use a metal bowl for *S. Hahnii* and white/plain coloured ceramic containers for others. Yes, you can plant succulents directly into *any* container; however, if there is no drainage hole just add a layer of grit to the bottom before adding compost which should also be slightly gritty. Why not combine several small succulents in a shallow dish, using different shapes and textures, topping them off with something like small slate

chippings to create an 'arid landscape'; a few strategically placed larger stones add interest and keep taller specimens upright till they establish themselves. Set the container on a low table for best effect but do check if its porous as you may need a mat underneath. Just do **not** over-water. Children should love having go a at this.

'Mini' succulents (often just labelled as 'succulents') are also to be found in your supermarket, often in their own small ceramic pot – just don't forget they will grow albeit slowly! These can be very cheap so grouping three/five together (perhaps on a shelf) will look very much *in vogue*. Other succulents to look out for are *Crassula*, *Kalanchoe*, and the rosette-shaped *Aloes* and *Echeverias*; there are also some trailing varieties of *Peperomias* to pop onto a shelf. Check them out – you will be surprised at the new varieties on offer – even those of you who manage to 'kill off' indoor plants should be able to succeed with these. Give them a go - you really can't fail!

Don't forget: most houseplants will benefit from a spell outdoors over the summer in a little shade. If spider mite and other bugs are a problem, a gentle blast with the hose should see them off (this also works well to rid roses of greenfly). An ailing plant may often revive if given a 'last chance' outside: it does work!


Whilst Visitors are welcome to join us on a limited number of occasions, paying a donation each time, Members are given priority, for safety reasons, due the halls limited capacity.

Post office: The Parish Council is continuing to meet with Post Office representatives to find a permanent arrangement to retain the Post Office services in the Dedham. The initial interim proposal is likely to be the provision of a Mobile Post Office coming to the village, two or three times a week. A notice about this provision will appear on the Dedham Parish Council Website and on the DPC noticeboard when the days of the week are finalised. It is hoped that this will begin on 3rd July. It is important that residents use this facility as it will provide proof of continuing need for the provision of PO services in the village.

Play equipment consultation: The result of the recent consultation on additional play and exercise equipment was discussed at the June parish council meeting. The full report is available on the DPC website. A total of 31 questionnaires were returned, 29 of which were completed by Dedham residents and the remaining two by people who work in the village. Not everyone answered all the questions. In summary, 12 people were in favour of play equipment for older children and 17 against, with one person saying that we should provide an additional piece of equipment suitable for disabled children. The proposed location was favoured by only nine respondents with 22 saying it was unsuitable. There was a majority in favour of retaining and re-locating the existing wooden adult exercise equipment with 19 in favour and 12 against. With regard to alternative adult exercise equipment, 11 were in favour and 20 against. There was even less support for exercise equipment for children, with 3 in favour and 28 against. When respondents were asked whether they would support adult or children's equipment if it came to a straight choice, more were in favour of adult

equipment (9 for adult equipment, versus 6 for children with an additional 2 for disabled only). DPC will not therefore be providing any additional equipment for older children. However, we will be relocating and repairing where necessary the existing wooden exercise equipment to make it easier to use.

Lighting consultation: At the June meeting, the results of the consultation on additional lighting was also discussed. Again, the full report is on the DPC website. 84 responses were received in total. Of these 28 indicated a 'No' vote for all questions and 56 positive responses were received supporting at least one of the three options on which consultation was sought. 50 people were in support of additional lighting on the corner of Brook Street outside Dedham Hall and 52 people were in favour of low level lighting across the Drift, controlled by motion sensors. These two schemes will now be progressed to technical appraisal. We also asked about lighting in Royal Square, but this did not receive majority support (40 votes for) and so will not be progressed. Thank you to all of you who took the trouble to let us have your views.

The next meeting will be on Monday 1 July 2019 at the Duchy Barn. All are welcome. There is no scheduled meeting in August.
