



Following Parish Council website: the decision by Essex County Council to close down the Essexinfo website service. Dedham Parish Council had to look for another provider for its In November, the service website. provided by OneSuffolk was chosen. Stake and support for summer success

April is an exciting time for gardeners. Although there's always the potential for showers and maybe a frost, the month also brings the Easter bank holiday and (weather permitting) plenty of time to be out in the beds and borders. Green shoots have emerged on trees and shrubs and are coming up from the ground. So it's time to get stakes and supports in if the garden is to look its best in the height of summer.

I've discovered the benefits of 6mm mild steel and use metre-high stakes as well as lengths bent into hoops of various sizes. I love how they quickly rust, making them much more discreet than bamboo canes, although I have to be careful not to take my eye out when bending down to weed around them. One of my borders has a looser, cottage garden feel with Camassia leichtlinii, herbaceous peonies, shrub roses, asters delphiniums, hollyhocks, hardy geraniums and oriental poppies spilling out and over each other. Here I use a series of vertical stakes with string criss-crossing between them at the bottom, middle and top so that plant stems can gradually grow through hiding strings and stakes - without much further interference from me.

I've also got wires along boundary fences where I'll tie in roses, clematis and — on the front of the house — Clematis armandii. I also have rambling rose Paul's Himalayan Musk and a lovely but unnamed, velvety purple Clematis viticella scrambling over and around my shed and up into an old greengage tree.

By tying in climbing and rambling roses

horizontally (or close to it) I can encourage more sideshoots along the length of the stem, which will all try to climb vertically and end up giving me more flowers. You could also try pegging them down – something they do well at RHS Sissinghurst – by selecting 4-6 of the strongest stems (remove weaker ones entirely), ideally 8 -10 feet long. Bend them over and tie them in at the base to a stake in the middle of the plant.



As ever, if you're not supporting plants, there's probably something you can prune. My Penstemon 'Raven' should be 'breaking' right about now, so look for new shoots coming up at the base of the plant and cut just above them. You can also prune lacecap and mophead Hydrangea now having left the old flowers on over winter for interest and to protect the stems and new buds for the coming season. Remove the old flowerheads by cutting just above a pair of fat, healthy buds – be careful not to knock any off accidentally.

Other deciduous, early-flowering shrubs can be pruned too once flowering is finished. It's the usual removal of the

dead, damaged or diseased stems, taking off the more spindly growth to create an open framework to let air and light in. Here in the garden, I can take my secateurs to flowering currant *Ribes sanguineum* and a *Weigela* 'Bristol Ruby', cutting back to a strong young shoot lower down the stems.

I have a couple of peach trees — one fan trained — and a patio apricot and, if the weather is too wet for bees to be flying, it can't do any harm to nip out with a small fine-bristled paint brush and run it from blossom to blossom to hand pollinate them. In theory this will ensure a better crop, which will be nice as I've only managed to rescue one peach so far from ravening wasps.

As things really get going in the garden, don't forget to keep an eye on your favourite weather app in case a late frost affects all your work.

If the patient subsequently tests positive, all people who were in proximity to the patient (e.g. other patients in the waiting room or staff who spoke to the patient) will need to be traced, isolated and tested.

It may seem that we are being overcautious, but I hope patients can see that the impact of a patient attending the practice with suspected Coronavirus is not only disruptive, but will also prevent the practice from providing urgent health care to patients if we need to close.

Please therefore be ultra-cautious. Follow advice from Public Health England and if you believe you may be at risk of contracting Coronavirus, stay at home and contact III for advice. Don't

come to the surgery.

During this period we continue to offer as normal a service as possible. Our telephone call back service means that many medical issues can be dealt with over the phone. Please also use our eConsult service for any non-urgent issues. You can send an eConsult request any time of the day and we will respond within 48 hours.

IMPORTANT CORRECTION

The caption for the illustration on page 18 of the March magazine showing Cedric Morris's painting of the burnt-out Art School in Mill Lane after the fire in 1939 should have stated that the photograph was reproduced by kind permission of the Cedric Morris Estate which holds the copyright. The picture is in the collections of the Colchester and Ipswich Museums at Christchurch Mansion.

Postscript to last month's Feature on the Dedham School of Drawing and Painting

Graham Manning who saw the photograph of Cedric Morris's painting in last month's Parish Magazine has shown me another view of the identical scene painted at the same time by one of his students, Felicity Hellaby.

Felicity's parents were both artists. Her father Richard Sydney Hellaby (1887-1971) was the son of the founder of the great New Zealand meat processors, R. & W. Hellaby's. He came to England to train at the Lambeth School of Art and later in Paris at the Académie Iulian and the École des Beaux Arts. Her mother Ruth (née Hollingsworth, 1880-1945) who had attended the Slade School of Art in London was known for her landscapes, figure and flower paintings. During the 1930s she was a regular exhibitor with the Ipswich Art Club. Both she and her husband were actively concerned with the protection of the local countryside. Richard was a founder member of the committee of the Dedham Vale Society set up in 1939 and became its Hon. Secretary in 1947. In 1932 he was exhibiting from Woodlands, Holbrook but by 1937 and perhaps earlier he and his wife were living in Dedham at Lower Park, a grey

gault brick house built before 1777 and enlarged during the 19th century; so by the time Cedric Morris's School opened in the village Felicity was conveniently placed to attend. Not long after his wife's death in 1945 Richard Hellaby remarried and went to live in Devon before moving to Cape Town where he died in 1971.

While they were both pupils at the art school in Dedham Felicity met Lucian Freud. He was seventeen and she, a year younger, became his first girlfriend. In 1941 he painted a portrait of her

entitled "The Girl on the Quay" and his correspondence survives in the form of a series of faux-childish illustrated letters and postcards he wrote to "Darling Felicity", mainly in 1943. Looking back on their friendship, Felicity said that she realised she had been lucky not to be too involved. "It was great fun to be with him", she said "but my husband shared my life and Lucian wouldn't have."

In 1950 Felicity married Eversley Belfield (1916-1986), a military historian, lecturer and author who had spent part of his childhood in Dedham, where his mother built Birketts Wood in Bargate Lane. Felicity's sister-in-law Penelope (Pearl) Gatehouse (née Belfield) will be familiar to visitors to Castle House as the girl holding the parasol in Sir Alfred Munnings's 1939 series of paintings of "The White Canoe". In her Memoirs Pearl records meeting Felicity at this time and describes Lower Park as "the nicest house in Dedham". Since the models he used were all local people known to Munnings, it is possible that Felicity, whose parents like Pearl's were part of his circle in the village, may have been the other girl in the canoe.
