



Dear Friends,

As February arrives, we find ourselves once again on the threshold of Lent, a significant season in the Christian Calendar marked by Reflection, Repentance, and Renewal. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on 18th February, inviting us to pause and consider our everyday actions and attitudes in daily life – a good discipline for everyone whether they have a faith or not.

In our parishes, we will mark Ash Wednesday with services of Holy Communion, offering all an opportunity to receive the imposition of ashes and reflect together. The imposition of ashes is being marked in ash with a small cross on our foreheads, made from last year's Palm Sunday crosses. This serves as a poignant reminder of our human frailty and the call to turn our hearts back to God. "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3 verse 19) echoes through our churches, prompting us to embrace humility and seek forgiveness.

Lent is a journey of forty days (excluding Sundays), echoing Jesus' time spent fasting in the wilderness. It is a time for spiritual discipline, whether through prayer, fasting, or charitable giving.

Many choose to give up luxuries or take on new commitments, but the essence of Lent is not merely self-denial. Instead, it is a chance to deepen our relationship with God and one another, to clear away distractions, and to open ourselves to transformation. As we begin this sacred season, let us all take the opportunity to pause, reflect and notice our relationships with one another; in our families and in our communities and work/school places.

Let us all approach this season with open hearts, ready to be shaped by compassion and care for one another in these dark winter days, anticipating better times as surely as spring follows winter. For Christians, it is God's love and grace that we are particularly thankful for as we approach Easter, and it is God's love we seek to imitate and share. Lent is not only a time for personal growth, but also for strengthening the bonds within our community. May our journey this Lent lead us to Easter with a deeper sense of Hope and Joy.

I'm not going to say much about the quotation above, from the 19th century American abolitionist and writer, Harriet Beecher Stowe, most famous as the author of the anti-slavery novel, Uncle Tom's Cabin. It's not that I don't have thoughts, or that her words don't encourage deep reflections in me. But, despite the "thees and thous" in the

language of her day, I fear that any spin of mine might get in the way of your own response to her words. Take your time. Read them over. And ponder awhile ...

I went back to her book, Life's Mystery, after I'd received a number of responses to my recent piece on "mystery", and how we have to try, as best we can, to live with the mysteries of life, and not be weighed down trying to find answers for, or meaning in, everything. To find rest from our explaining and complaining is, surely, a good place to be.

One friend posed two questions for me on Epiphany Sunday – when we traditionally remember the Wise Men bringing gifts to Jesus at Bethlehem – in this form. "Are you preaching on Epiphany? And, if so, are you going to explain what happened to the gold, frankincense and myrrh after Mary and Joseph left Bethlehem with Jesus?"

The answers were "yes" (I was, indeed, preaching on January 4th) and "no", I have no idea what happened to the Wise Men's gifts ... It's a mystery I can live with.

But another friend was on a different tack, and quoted some words from the 19th century American Presbyterian minister, Ichabod Spencer:

*“Whoever believes in a God at all,
believes in an infinite mystery;
and if the existence of God is such an
infinite mystery,*

*we can very well expect and afford
to have many of His ways mysterious to us.
To believe in “in infinite mystery” and accept
God’s mysterious ways, is a place where I’m
more than happy to find my rest for now.*

CRIB SERVICES IN DEDHAM CHURCH



We had two crib services in Dedham Church this year due to an overflow last year, and both were very well attended. It was lovely to see the church full of families enjoying the Christmas message about the birth of Jesus.

This year the retiring collection for both services was £776 and this has been given to Dedham Therapy Farm.

Dedham Therapy Farm provides bespoke, person-centred therapeutic services and occupational therapy using nature and animals. They improve people's physical and mental health using Animal-Assisted Intervention and ASDAN short Courses.

They empower people to develop, recover, or maintain their well being through nature, animals and meaningful activities. Whether they have anxiety, learning disabilities, autism or phobia, they are there to help. A very deserving local non profit organisation.

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS



The work on the windows and masonry project will begin in the week beginning 19th January with scaffolding being put in place, and three windows being removed for repair (one in the vestry).

Masonry work will be undertaken over the following weeks externally and the windows replaced in March. Disruption will be kept to a minimum and internal scaffolding removed whilst the masonry work is done. The organ will be out of use for two Sundays during this time.

FEBRUARY 2026 DIARY

February 8th.

The Deanery choir will be singing at **St Georges Church, Great Bromley CO7 7TS** at the 11am communion service. The choir will sing 'Lord, make me to know thy ways' by William Byrd. Byrd (1540 – 1623) was an English Renaissance composer considered among the greatest composers of the Renaissance, he had a profound influence on composers both from his native country and on the Continent. He is often considered along with John Dunstable and Henry Purcell as one of England's most important composers of early music.

In 1577, the same year that recusancy (the refusal to attend Anglican services) laws began to be enforced, Byrd and his family moved to Harlington, Middlesex. As a devout lifelong Roman Catholic, he probably preferred the greater privacy of living outside London. Yet, in spite of his close social contact with many other Catholics, some of whom were certainly implicated in treasonable activities, his own loyalty to the government was never questioned.

Also in 1591 a manuscript volume of Byrd's keyboard music was prepared for "my Ladye Nevell" (probably Elizabeth, wife of Sir Henry Nevile), and many more keyboard pieces found their way into the early 17th-century volume known as the Fitzwilliam Virginal Book, copied by another well-known Catholic, Francis Tregian, during his imprisonment in the Fleet Prison.

Dedham Parish Council Meeting Report – Monday, 1st December 2025.

Co-option of new Councillor to Dedham Parish Council

Terry Haines was co-opted onto the Council.

Public Forum

Parking at the Drift, Manningtree Road and Crown Street junction has become a problem and it was requested that Essex Highways should be contacted regarding the extension of double yellow lines.

This to be investigated.

Bus timetables – Several residents commented on problems with the timetables and drivers not knowing routes. This will be followed up.

The pavement in Crown Street near Munnings is missing and is dangerous. This will be followed up and reported to Highways

Consideration of a Solicitor to act for the Council when needed

It was agreed to seek quotes for a solicitor to provide ongoing professional advice,

Fish and Chip van siting

A risk assessment was undertaken regarding the location of the fish and chip van on Royal Square.

It was agreed to have a designated space on the Square for any approved street trader.

Discussions were ongoing with Colchester CC on advice and possible relocation to main car park but in the meantime the current location of the fish and chip van was agreed with one councillor abstaining.

Parish Plan

Cllr McLaughlin gave a report on this to say a list of parish clubs, charities and business had been completed and a letter will go out to these after the Christmas period.

Dedham - Munnings and Constable update.

Cllr Bourn reported on plans by East Bergholt Parish Council regarding the Constable celebrations and it was agreed to work closely with them.

An event in Dedham Parish Church is being considered

With regard to Munnings Museum anniversary, Essex Record Office have agreed to support training of volunteers to interview local residents who may have known Alfred and Violet Munnings. Meeting to share experiences planned for Friday January 19th at Munnings Museum.

Local Plan Consultation

It was noted that Colchester Council's Local Plan Committee, recently voted to submit the draft local plan for consultation. The next step in the process called a Regulation 18 consultation. This gives more weight to the sites in the draft for planning reasons.

Pylons

A submission to the consultation was made by the Council. It was agreed that there will be need for coordination with other bodies including Dedham Vale Society and other Parish Councils on impact of disruption of the construction of the pylons is likely to bring to the area.

Finance, Standards and Procedures

The Finance group is looking at the draft budget at its next meeting.

Grants for Sports Club and Community Christmas Party agreed.

Infrastructure and Community areas

The group reported on the painting competition with the school for the new speeding signs around the village.

Regarding lighting on Mill Lane, it was agreed the Council would pay for the replacement lights.

Communications

The Council agreed to have a professional support consultant to help councillors with any issues they may have with IT.

Parish Council Update (January)

A number of issues have been drawn to the attention to the Council recently which we feel residents need to be aware of.

Dog Fouling.

The first is the apparent increase in dog fouling around the village. This has now become a major problem on paths in the middle of the village, along Crown Street and through the Drift.

Residents are reminded that dog fouling is illegal with a significant fine. It is also very anti-social and has become an issue, particularly for families taking their children to school.

Garden waste bins and recycling waste.

The second is the location of garden refuse bins and recycling bins on the side of roads. Residents should be leaving their bins in their driveways or just outside their houses. There have been reports of bins scattered around making it difficult for people to pass. Please be mindful of other residents.

DEDHAM PARISH MAGAZINE IS 150 YEARS OLD IN 2026.

Throughout 2026 we will be having a look back at what was happening in Dedham 150 years ago in 1876, with items from the magazine and archive Newspaper reports. The very first edition of the magazine from January is included on the following three pages, the original was three pages long with no front cover illustration. AI has been used to extract the text from images from the magazine, as well as enhancing the actual extracts from the magazine pages. In February 1876 the editor announced that they were organising a copper plate engraving of the Church to use in future editions of the magazine.

ETCHING OF THE PARISH CHURCH.—The cost of a copper etching of the Parish Church, to be placed on the first page of the Magazine, will be £1 12s. 6d. Of this sum £1 has already been contributed by one parishioner, and 5s. by two others. Mr. Scott will be glad to receive contributions towards the remaining sum of 7s. 6d.

It is hoped that many of the parishioners will contribute papers of *local* interest to the Magazine. The manuscripts should be sent early in the month, addressed, "The Editor of the Dedham Parish Magazine," at Mr. Scott's Dedham.

A DESIRE having been several times expressed that Dedham, like many other places, should have its Parish Magazine, it has been decided to localise Home Words for that purpose. The outside pages of the magazine will contain purely local information, whilst the central sheets will consist of interesting stories, addresses, poetry, etc., with illustrations. At the end of the year the twelve local covers can be bound up together at the end of the volume. The local information will consist of a Monthly Calendar with notices of Services, Meetings, Classes, etc.; the hours of Church Services and Sacraments; the date of Parish or Missionary Meetings, and accounts of them after they have taken place; statements of accounts of Offertories, Collections, School Funds, etc.; and a Register of Baptisms, Marriages, and Deaths for the preceding month. From time to time short articles will appear on the History of Dedham Church, the History of the Dedham Grammar School, and the Lives of the Lecturers, and on other matters connected with the history of Dedham. The cost of the Magazine will be one penny per month. A List of Bible Questions will be printed each month in the central sheets. Answers to these should be sent to the Rev. J. G. Mills, not later than the 20th of each month. The names of those who send in correct answers will be printed in the next issue of the Magazine. At the end of the year a prize will be presented to the sender of the best complete set of answers.

Persons intending to take in the Magazine are requested to leave their names and residences at Mr. Kirkman's, Chemist, Dedham. The Magazine will then be sent to them each month.

In issuing the first number of the Dedham Parish Magazine, we take the opportunity of calling the attention of the Parishioners to:

(i) The Church.—The piety of our fore-fathers has provided for this parish a truly noble building for the public worship of God. The privilege of worshipping in such a grand old church being granted but to few parishes, the parishioners of Dedham have cause to be proud of their house of God, and doubtless, when the time arrives, will join heartily together in the work of restoration, more particularly of the exterior, which cannot be far distant, if the church is to be preserved from decay and ruin. During the past year portions of the exterior have been several times repaired, but there can be no doubt whatever that a complete restoration of the exterior is required as soon as possible.

(ii) The Schools. The state of both Sunday and Day schools is satisfactory and encouraging. The Government Grant in to the Day schools was larger than that of previous years, thus testifying to the increased efficiency of the schools. Grants were also made last year towards the enlargement of the National Schools: £30 by the Essex Diocesan Board of Education, and 21s by the National Society. The whole cost of the enlargement was £258 11. 8d., and increased accommodation was thus provided for 60 children. In the Sunday school the numbers have increased both in the Boys and Girls' Schools, as will be seen from the following figures

We cannot close this brief review of the work done in the parish during 1875 without acknowledging the devoted labour of our District Visitors and Sunday school Teachers. To them we would address the words of St. Paul as an encouragement in their work: "Be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

THE GRAMMAR SCHOOL

The number of boys on the roll for the term ending at Christmas, 1875, was 90, W. J. Chapman, the captain, and R. H. Walker proceeded to St. John's College, Cambridge, and have since passed the previous examination; the former being in the first division in both parts, the latter in the second, and both have passed in the additional subjects for honours. The other old Dedhamians at presenting residence at Cambridge, are: H. Pollexfen, scholar of Pembroke R. T. Pollexfen, Pembroke, J. W. Woolley, Corpus, H. Newman, Sidney, H. Wood, Trinity. C. A. Bree and S. H. Turner graduated in June, 1875.

DEDHAM NATIONAL SCHOOLS.

On Thursday, December 23, the annual Christmas examination of these Schools took place. The Schoolroom was very prettily decorated for the occasion by the teachers. Amongst the parishioners present, in addition to a large number of the parents of the children, were Mrs., Miss, and Mr. R. Murray, Mr. and Miss Edwards, Mrs. Penrose, Mrs. Ashwin, Mrs. Chitty, Mr. and Mrs. Rodwell, Mr. and the Misses Cobbold, Miss Elton, Miss Lermit, etc. In opening the proceedings, the Rev. J. G. Mills apologised for the absence of the Revs. Drs. Ashwin and Lermit and Mr. Penrose, who were unavoidably absent. In the course of some further remarks Mr. Mills mentioned that in future only those children who made the full number of attendances required by the Government for presentation at examination (viz., 250), would be allowed to come to the annual Summer Treat. The children then sang the hymn, "We meet again;" after which they were examined in Scripture and Catechism by Mr. Mille. The manner in which they repeated, explained, and gave references of, passages of Scripture committed to memory, was exceedingly good. The examination in arithmetic was conducted by Mr. J. W. Brooke that in reading and

spelling by Mr. Cobbold; and that in geography, by Mr. Ehrke. Between the different examinations songs were sung and pieces recited by the children. The songs sung were, "Be kind to each other," "Bright beams the Morning," "Winter," and "Far Away." Those who recited pieces were:-Ada Boutell, Anna Smith, Hetty Hitchcock, Fanny Watson, W. White, G. Hudson, Herbert Cook, Ellen Hudson, Emma Thorington, and Agnes Ham. During the evening specimens of the children's needlework and writing were handed round the room for inspection. Prizes were presented to the children by Mrs. Murray and Mrs. Penrose. Mr. Mills, for Mrs. Clarke, presented the prizes which she had offered for home work. The prize boys and girls were George Boutell, John Fulcher, Ernest Spurgeon, Emma Cullem, Ellen Smith, Chas. Freeman, Kate Harrison, Annie Howard, Minnie Watson, Benjamin Munson, Ellen Richer, Ellen Howard, Herbert Cook, Annie Harrison, Rose Gallant, William Wadley, and Elizabeth Gallant. A dress, kindly given by Mrs. Lermit to the mother of the child making the largest number of attendances during the year, was presented to Mrs. Chaplin. In future, the parent must live half-a-mile from the school. Mr. Mills then addressed a few words to the parents, and concluded Happy Christmas. He trusted that it would by wishing both parents and children a season not of mere worldly happiness, but that they would have that true happiness which we can only possess by knowing Him who is the source of all true happiness, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The national anthem was then sung by the children, who, after giving lusty cheers for Mrs. Clarke and her assistants, and the examiners, were regaled with buns, which by kind forethought had been provided for them.

TRANSITION INTO SPRING

February is a transitional month in the garden - still very much winter, but full of signs that spring is approaching as the days get longer and the soil slowly starts to warm again.

Look around the garden and you'll find snowdrops, crocus, winter aconites and camellias bringing the first real colour of the year (green doesn't count).

I'm cutting back the leaves of my hellebores to remove signs of black spot and display the flowers to their best advantage. Elsewhere, daffodils are coming into flower, seeming to bloom earlier than ever – one of our members had a daff in full flower on Christmas Day! – while indoors, I've amaryllis and forced hyacinths cheering the place up.

If vegetables are your thing, you might still be harvesting the winter cabbages, sprouts, leeks and parsnips that you

didn't eat over Christmas.

However, generally February is a great time to shake off the last of the winter lull and begin preparing your garden for the growing year to come. Traditional cottage gardens would mix ornamental plants (grown for flowers or foliage, rather than to eat) with edibles, and

rhubarb can look wonderfully architectural among your flowers. It can also be grown in a large pot – just divide it and share it with friends when it gets too big. If you haven't already done it, early in the month is really your last opportunity to cover the plant with a bucket or forcer to exclude light and grow stems that are a lovely tender and juicy pink. Yum!

There are several seeds worth sowing under cover this month – I have some windowsill propagators that are ideal for starting off my tomatoes – as well as some that can be sown in a tray and left

in a sheltered area outside. The latter will usually be hardy annuals, biennials like foxgloves, or perennial seeds which may not germinate unless they think they've suffered through a winter season before the rise in temperature encourages them to sprout.

There's quite a bit of pruning you can do towards the end of the month. I've talked about roses in a previous article, but you can also cut back some clematis varieties (the Group 3s) in February. I've several in rich jewel tones like 'Gravetye



Clematis (summer flowering)

'Beauty', 'Rooguchi', 'Madame Julia Correvon' and 'Niobe'. All flower later in the summer and benefit from being pruned to a pair of healthy buds 20-30cm from the base of the plant. I love them for their different shapes and wide range of colours. Well chosen, you can have a clematis of one form or another in flower throughout the year, but they can take a while to establish.

If you're fond of a rhyme (and who isn't), there are a couple to help with the first being especially apt right now: 'if they flower before June, don't prune'. The second gives you some reassurance if

you think the plant you put in last year has turned up its toes: "the first year they sleep, the second year they creep, and the third year they leap". Just give them some feed, try to keep the roots cool in the heat of summer, and don't accidentally dig them up, and they'll eventually do you proud.

As part of the plan to rejuvenate one of my borders, I'll also cut back my deciduous ornamental grasses, the two-metre tall *Miscanthus sinensis* 'Malepartus' which have grown into significant clumps over the last decade. I'm going to divide them and discard any sections that are no longer performing well before replant some of the pieces in other places around the garden. They are great for creating informal screening and creating surprise and interest.

If you have just a balcony, patio or small courtyard, plant lily bulbs now for stunning scented blooms in the summer. If you're pots and containers have been planted for a while, remember that the soil may have run out of nutrients by now and will need more to grow well in the season to come. You don't always have to re-pot them; instead, you can 'top dress' which just means replacing the first two inches of compost with fresh and adding a sprinkling of slow-release fertiliser.

Start warming up for spring with a bit of time among your pots and borders this month. It'll be worth it – I promise!
